Gary Garner Named "Distinguished Professor of Music"

Dr. Gary Garner, Director of University Bands and Conductor of the WTSU Orchestra, was recently chosen to receive the Beatrice Carr Pickens Distinguished Professorship in Music. Pictured above are Dr. Garner and Mrs. Pickens.

Gary joined the WTSU faculty in 1963. He was in the first group of faculty to be awarded the WTSU Faculty Award for Teaching Excellence in 1981. In 1984 he received the Minnie Stevens Piper Award and was recognized as one of the ten most outstanding professors in the state of Texas. This year he was named Texas Bandmaster of the Year at the annual convention of the Texas Bandmasters Association in

San Antonio. Under his leadership, the WT Symphonic Band has given two performances in Carnegie Hall in New York City in 1983 and 1987. The band has been honored with more invitations (seven) to perform at the Texas Music Educators Association meetings than any other university band in the state. The band will give a concert at the 1988 convention on Friday, February 12, at noon in the convention center auditorium.

Mrs. Pickens, whose husband is T. Boone Pickens, chairman of the WTSU Board of Regents, has a strong interest in the arts. She is a past member of the Texas Commission on the Arts, past president of the Amarillo Art Center Board of Directors, a member of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce Arts District, 1985 and 1986

chairman for the Amarillo Rotary Club Art Show, and an honorary board member for the Amarillo Art Center.

"I am honored to have received a professorship named for Mrs. Pickens. She has meant so much to the development of music and the arts not only here at the university but throughout the Panhandle," Garner said.

The professorship, made available through private funding, is the second to be awarded at WTSU as part of President Ed Roach's goal to provide at least one professorship in each of the institution's departments or divisions. "West Texas State is very fortunate to have faculty of the quality of Gary Garner," Roach said.

Completion of the DMA in performance and musicology at North Texas State University brought a grant and took him to England, all of which will make Dr. Hansen the authority on the complete songs of Sir Lennox Berkley, with his forthcoming critical commentary.

Other faces, although young but not new, are in new positions. Cloyce Beard, who graduated with an MM last December, in now instructor in voice. Returning alumnus Randy Talley is now director of choral activities. Randy was the choir director at Permian High School in Midland before returning to WT as a

faculty member. Donald Lefevre (BM 79) is now instructor of saxophone and assistant band director. Don received the Master of Music degree from the University of Michigan, where he studied with Donald Sinta. He served as assistant band director at Robert E. Lee High School in Midland and director of bands at San Jacinto Junior High School.


