#### Murray Debut and ISB Convention

During the week of June 18 the International Society of Bassists held its biennial convention at New York University in New York City. Master classes and performances took place throughout the week.

The Bass Buddies of WTSU (pictured left to right: David Murray, director, and students Nicky Scales, Lori Sitton, Mary Gottschalk, Todd Allen, and Marcus Rice) performed twice during the course of the convention to very favorable audiences made up of bassists of all ages and from all parts of the United States, Canada, and Europe.

The Bass Buddies also had the opportunity to meet and hear bassists who teach, perform, and study in various parts of the world. The group performed as a part of the mass outdoor bass concerts in Washington Square and Lincoln Center.

In addition to all of the activities at the convention, WT instructor of bass David Murray presented a concert at the National Arts Club followed by his official New York City debut at the Carnegie Recital Hall on June 21. He performed to a full house and was rewarded with a standing ovation at the completion of the recital. The pianist for the recital was Mary Ann Brown of New York City and guest artist was bass virtuoso Gary Karr.

#### International Appeal

There is a group becoming increasingly important on the WTSU campus—"returning students". Returning students comprise 40 percent of the student body and bring to the campus a maturity and purpose often not developed in younger students less experienced in life.

Returning students have special needs not always taken into consideration. Many are married with families to attend to in addition to attending classes. In spite of their purposeful return to the campus from "real life," they harbor a certain lack of confidence, sometimes in their ability to succeed. Indeed, they usually succeed and add a welcome depth to the learning experience we are concerned with enhancing.

The returning student body includes most of the international students, and these students have additional special needs. They are dealing with English as a second language while taking leveling courses in addition to core curriculum. Currently Canada, Japan, Jordan, Thailand and Taiwan are represented in the department of music and dance.

A relatively new valuable source of graduate students is the People's Republic of China. The department has one student from China who will graduate soon. There is one obstacle prospective students from China have that most international students do not have: they must have a sponsor in the United States before they will be granted a visa. This stems from the fact that the average monthly income in China is about \$50, and the federal government wants some assurance that such students will not become a ward of the state.

The students from China tend to be very industrious. After they have been on campus a semester with scholarships, they learn to be virtually independent, for their way of life is quite frugal..

Currently there is a talented young composer in Guangdong, China, who is very eager to enter the graduate program at WT, but he needs a sponsor. Anyone interested in sponsoring a graduate student from China should contact Stanley Potter in the department of music and dance—soon!

International students, themselves, bring a depth that is far reaching, much beyond the campus boundary.

#### From the Music Office

Have you heard any good "Aggie Jokes" lately? If so, you might send 'em to Canyon because, if you haven't heard, we are now officially a part of the Texas A&M University System.

So, what does this mean for music at WTSU? Well, to mention the first thing that comes to mind is an increase in enrollment. The university as a whole increased 8.5% this fall, the largest jump in enrollment in many years. We have experienced a similar increase in music majors.

Other advantages are as of yet only projected, but we think that being a part of an internationally recognized university system will enhance the academic standing of WT. In just the short time we have been a part of TAMUS (Texas A&M University System) we have seen a number of internal initiatives that relate to research. Only time will tell how this will develop into specific benefits, but for now, we'll settle for increased enrollment.

There is some talk about changing the name of the university. The leading suggestion at this point seems to be, "West Texas A&M." While it is far from certaint that there will be any change, all alumni are invited to send suggestions. If sent to the music office, we'll see that they are forwarded.

In closing, I would like to again say how much we appreciate your outstanding support for *Ritornello*, the TMEA Alumni Reception and music scholarships. As reported in last spring's issue, our total was almost \$10,000 for 1990. We hope you'll continue to help the department with your gifts. And send us an Aggie joke or two . . .

Gardner holds a bachelor of music degree in organ performance from the University of North Texas. He completed post-graduate study in organ, piano, conducting, and vocal coaching under Finn Viderø, Anshel Brusilov, Boris Goldovsky, and Peter Herman Adler. Gardner has held numerous professional positions including appointments at Texas Woman's University, the New England Conservatory of Music, Tufts University, and the Juilliard School of Music.

His compositions have enjoyed premiers in the Boston area and Gardner was selected as a national winner of the American Guild of Organists-Moller Organ Company Award for Choral Composition. His works are published by the E. C. Schirmer Galaxy Music Publishers of Boston.

Commerically, several state and national advertising spots have been scored by Gardner, currently including the Affiliated Foods jingle.

Since 1985, Gardner has served as staff musician at St. Thomas Catholic Church in Amarillo. His new appointment as instructor of organ at WT opens new doors for artistic and personal growth for Gardner.

"I'm very excited about being a part of the WT faculty," said Gardner. "The faculty has a deep commitment to the education and welfare of the student both professionally and personally. This is not a commodity that is found in all the schools of music and conservatories one could mention. It makes me proud to be a member of this teaching community." Stephen M. Hopkins has been appointed acting director of choral conducting for the 1990-91 school year. He is currently completing a doctorate of musical arts degree in choral conducting from the University of Texas in Austin.

He received a master of music in choral conductions from the University of Texas and a bachelor of music education from Murray State University in Murray, Ky. He has seven years teaching experience in Tennessee and Texas public schools.

J. Eric Wilson is a University of Michigan graduate with a master of music degree in saxophone performance and a minor in conducting.

Wilson was a teaching assistant in the conducting department and conducted many of the university's major ensembles.

Wilson was a winner of the Graduate Concerto Competition while performing with the University of Michigan Chamber Orchestra. Wilson also performed with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra during a debut performance of their new music director and conductor, Neeme Jarvey. Wilson is also a graduate of Abilene Christian University where he received a bachelor of music education degree.

Wilson is an active performer and has been a soloist with bands, orchestras and chamber groups.


Kirk Woolery ('74 BME) continues his work at Brownwood HS, sending his better players to WT as music majors. Thanks Kirk.



On Oct. 29, Arthur Lipner, a New York based jazz marimba/vibraphonist, presented a clinic and performance.

During the second week of January, David Effron will guest conduct the Amarillo Symphony and present a master class at WT.

The month of February will be particulary full with the Saslav Duo (violin and piano) in residency from the 10th until the 12th. The Saslavs, respected experts in the music of Haydn, will present a recital, a class on piano technique, coaching with the Harrington String Quartet, and a lecture on the music of Haydn.

Samuel Adler, professor of composition at the Eastman School of Music, will also be in the Panhandle for an Amarillo Symphony performance of his *Joi*, *Amor*, *Cortezia* and a master class on campus.

On Feb. 18, Harold Heiberg, renowned vocal coach, accompanist, and faculty member of the University of North Texas, will present a series of master classes on vocal repertoire.

#### Choir

This year the choirs combined for two works, Handel's Coronation Anthem The King Shall Rejoice and the chamber version of Fauré's Requiem, (edited by John Rutter). In addition, the Collegiate Choir performed Mozart's "Ave verum corpus" and his chorale "Regina coeli," K. 276.

As usual, the choirs sponsored the annual Homecoming "Pigskin Review" featuring both choirs, a scene from the fall musical *Brigadoon*, winners of last spring's University Sing, the band, and a host of "guest artists."

The choir and orchestra will also collaborate again for the annual Christmas Concert on Dec. 2, ending a busy weekend that will include two performances at the annual Madrigal Dinner.

The spring holds some excitement for the choirs. In March, the chorale is planning a tour of Austin, Abilene and Lubbock. Later in the spring, the WT choirs will be joined by the Eastern New Mexico University Choir, the Amarillo Civic Chorus, and the Polk Street United Methodist Choir with the Amarillo Symphony Orchestra in a performance of Verdi's Requiem. These performances will take place on April 26 and 27 as the concluding performance of the symphony's 1990-91 season.

#### Percussion Ensemble

The WTSU Percussion Ensemble will perform on Thursday, Feb. 7 at the Texas Music Educators Association Convention in San Antonio.

The 20 member ensemble, directed by percussion instructor Susan Martin and graduate assistant David Sorgi, will feature several contest level ensembles including works which will be added to the 1991 UIL class I contest list.

#### Band and Orchestra

The marching band is having a busy fall semester this year with five home games, a trip to Lawton, Okla. for the Cameron game with a stop in Altus, Okla. and an appearance at the Amarillo Marching Festival on Oct. 18. The stop in Altus was hosted by Larry Harris (class of '66) and the Altus High School Band. The stay there included a performance at the Altus High School football game, a tour through a C-5 transport on the Altus Air force Base and an Octoberfest celebration held on base. It was a great trip despite arriving home at 4 in the morning!

The exciting news about the upcoming concert season is the planned trip to Houston in February. The band will travel via Southwest Airlines, then tour the area on chartered buses.

The graduate assistant in band this year is Lisa Martinez of Odessa. Lisa completed her BME at WT in 1989 and taught for a year at Brenham before returning this fall. She was an ace clarinetist and flag captain as an undergradate. It's great to have her back.

The orchestra also has a graduate assistant this year. Sheri Scales, who finished her bachelor's degree last spring, is providing invaluable help in a variety of ways and of course continues to make her usual stellar contribution to the string section.
