From the Department Head's Office

"Churches welcome all denominations but most prefer tens and twenties." This is a quote I got from Bill Evans who recently read a book by Robert Burne entitled The Fourth and by Far the Most Recent 637 Best Things Ever Said. Since my topic for this issue is about patron contributions to support Ritornello, our TMEA reception in San Antonio, and the music scholarship fund, I thought it was a good way to introduce a few points about giving.

First the good news and a pat on the back for everyone. We have a wonderful group of alumni and friends who each year contribute. The following is a summary of our 1993 gifts:

Benefactor (\$500 or more) 1 gift Scholarship (\$200 or more) 21 gifts

Patron (\$25 or more) 201 gifts Contributors (\$5 or more) 10 gifts

A little addition shows that 232 people (more when you count the number of spouses) care enough about music at WT to make a contribution. This totaled over \$10,000 last year and was the largest single source of scholarships for music at WT. In this day when we see competition for outstanding music students escalating to a near frenzy, the support from our patrons has become crucial.

We are trying very hard to find ways to recognize our patrons. Also, we find that most of our contributors have been giving year after year. Some of the faculty have suggested that we include a small number after each name to indicate the number of years of contributing. This sounds like a good idea and our plans are to

begin doing this with the spring, 1994 edition of *Ritornello*. We have records that go back ten years; if you have been a patron for a longer period than this, we would welcome your help in extending our records.

The usual green sheet is enclosed. We hope you'll take a minute to send us a check. We will list your name(s) in the next *Ritornello* and also on the patron's page of the SHOWCASE OF MUSIC concert program.

I asked Bill Evans for a second quote to end this column. The best he could do to help me is the following (attributed to Groucho Marx). "If Noah had been truly wise, he would have swatted those two flies." Not sure what this has to do with giving to the scholarship fund, but thanks anyway, Bill.

Band/Orchestra News

At the time of this writing the band is just about to complete marching season and the orchestra is preparing for its first concert and a tour to Oklahoma.

The orchestra has been working especially hard to prepare for the tour, which will include stops in Enid, Putnam City, and Norman. The program will include Dvorak's Otello Overture, Haydn's Symphony no. 99, Suite no. 2 by Stravinsky, and Tarantella in A Minor by Bottesini with David Murray, bass soloist. The rest of the semester will be devoted to the annual Christmas Concert with the choirs on Friday, December 3.

The band also visited Oklahoma this fall. Our trip was to Durant for the game with Southeastern Oklahoma State University. We performed Friday night at the Putnam City West game, where we were hosted by WT alum Dr. Buzzy Green, Coordinator of Instrumental Music for the Putnam City school district. The bands will complete the semester with concerts on December 5 and 7 with the Concert and symphonic Bands, respectively.

Dance

The dance ensemble has another full fall semester. It started in August with two new contemporary ballets choreographed by guest artist Kay Braden. Ms. Braden was brought to us by Lone Star Ballet through a grant from the Texas Commission on the Arts. The dance ensemble went on to participate with Amarillo Opera in its production of *Kismet*. The dance ensemble continues to represent our school and region with performances in October for the Texas Good Sams Samboree in Amarillo and for the International Beauty Show in Dallas.

In November the dance ensemble will perform with the TEXAS Musical Drama company in representing our great state at the convention of the National Tour Association in Atlantic City, New Jersey. The dancers are looking forward to performing in December with the Lone Star Ballet in that festive season treat Tchaikovsky's Nutcracker.

Music Therapy

Alumni Notes

David Kaplan ('55-'60 faculty) was recently elected as an associate composer in the Canadian Music Centre. This means that in the future all of his works will be available through the Centre for performance or study. This past June the Saskatoon Klezmer Band was featured at the local jazz festival. He writes for the group and has directed this ten-member bunch for some years. Last year he was musical director again for the Saskatoon Opera Association, this time a series of Gilbert and Sullivan Gondolier performances. He is also involved with several composition projects and is finishing a book dealing with the history of the Saskatchewan Music Education Association. Currently, he is completing advisory duties with ten graduate students, master's and doctoral, and in the fall is teaching a correspondence course in music appreciation that he wrote for the University of Saskatchewan.

Bryan Burton (BME '71) recently had his book, Moving Within the Circle: Contemporary Native American Music and Dance, published. Two other books, Children's Songs and Games of Japan and Music of the Chiricahua Apache, are in progress. He continues to present many workshops: two sessions at the eastern division of MENC in March 1993; Orff Schulwerk Ethnic Workshop on Native American Music; a session at Colloquium for Teachers of Elementary Music Methods in July 1993; an instrumental literature workshop with Quincy Hilliard and a lecture/ demonstration at the International Kodaly Society Conference in August. In August he'll spend two weeks on the Crow Reservation in Montana working for the Smithsonian Institute as a researcher. This fall he has two conferences schedules with the Vermont MEA and the Virginia MEA. Currently he is Associate Professor of Music Education at West Chester University.

Rodney Miller (BM '74) and his wife, mezzo-soprano Pina Mozzani, were in China this summer at the invitation of China Conservatory of Music in Beijing, where they held two weeks of master-classes with the conservatory's advanced opera students. Besides the master classes, they performed two concerts of American

vocal music. An additional concert was held in Tianjin at the invitation of the conservatory there. This was Miller's second trip to China. In July he also traveled to Romania for the Constanta Festival of Romanian and American Music. Besides conducting master classes in American Musical Theater with Hyperion University, Miller sang two concerts with the Constanta Symphony Orchestra and a concert version of Hello Dolly with the opera company. He will be returning next year to sing Don Basilio in the premier of Rossini's Barber of Seville and will perform the first fully staged Hello Dolly, with his wife as Dolly, in the form iron curtain country. His book, The Institutionalization of Music is being published this fall. An Associate Professor at New York University, Miller is currently the Director of Vocal Studies in the Music Department.

Sheryl Anderson (BM '75) is launched on a new career as talent agent, succeeding in placing actors in TV commercials and in films shot in this area. Recently she cast extras/actors of Occhio Pinocchio, an Italian romantic comedy. Producers think downtown Happy and environs look like Italy.

Barbara Hrehor (BME '78) continues to teach grammar and composition at Sam Houston State in Huntsville. In a recent letter she writes "Music remains a lively avocation and ruling passion."

Frances Usury Bright
Ritchie (BS '40, MA ' 42) died in

and continued teaching piano locally. After his death in 1971, she moved to California and married Glen Ritchie. Meadows Guest Artists

In the spring semester there will recitals and master classes by clarinetist Todd Palmer, English pianist Graham Scott, and bassist Diana Gannett.

Elsa Porter Scholarship

Elsa Porter ('56-'89 faculty) has given a \$5,000 endowment to the West Texas A&M University Foundation to fund the Elsa Porter Applied Voice Scholarship.

She holds degrees from Texas
Christian University and the
University of Oklahoma, and she has

The Meadows artists combine with Amarillo Symphony soloists for the Master Series, including pianist Jerome Lowenthal, violinist Dmitri Berlinsky, violinist Dylana Jenson, jazz drummer Ed Soph, cellist Steven Doane, oboist Wayne Rapier, soprano Christine Brewer, pianist Graham Scott, conductor Adrian Gnam, bassist Diana Gannett, soprano Anne Achenbach, and baritone Samuel Mungo!

Opera/Musical Theatre

The Opera/Musical Theatre Workshop hit the boards running this fall, joining forces once again with the Branding Iron Theatre, to produce Jerry Herman's rollicking musical comedy, Mame. Senior Music Therapy major Shelley St. Clair headed the large cast that also featured music majors Ron Loyd, Pam Parks, Amy Burns, Michelle Capes, Sean Warley, Jessica Boyd, Amey Szanto, Troy Larson and musical theatre majors Chris Lusk and Eric Hall, with a large supporting cast of both music and theatre majors. The spring opera production will be an American work, Robert Ward's setting of Arthur Miller's play, The Crucible. The hauntingly beautiful music of the opera captures the drama of the Salem witchcraft trials in a stirring and poignant way.

Faculty Footnotes

Joe Cox traveled to Brownsville, Texas, to give brass clinics at Pace, Hamm, Porter, and Riviera High Schools. Alumnus John Reiman is teaching at Pace.

David Murray released his debut CD last May and it has been distributed in the US, Canada, and Europe. It contains music of Telemann, Copland, Mendelssohn, Kodaly, and Bottesini, most of which has not been recorded by a bassist before. It's available at Hastings in Amarillo and the WT bookstore. David has also been contacted by STRAD, the string magazine, for a picture that will accompany a review of his CD.

In May David and **Tina**Carpenter traveled to the east coast and eastern Canada, giving concerts in

North Carolina, New York City, Halifax, and Ontario. Duos by Albert Roussel and Allan Blank were featured and these duos were repeated on David's recital at the International Society of Bassists Convention at Interlochen in early July, where David also presented a master class. The Blank duo, which was written for Tina and David, was presented at the International Double Reed Society Convention in Minneapolis in late July.

Robert Hansen has been elected vice president of the National Opera Association. He will be assuming responsibility for the program activities of the organization which serves opera/musical theatre educators in universities, conservatories, and opera companies world wide. On the performing front, he sang the tenor lead, Count Almaviva, in Amarillo Opera's spring production of *The Barber of Seville*.

Dawn Harms has been music director of the Amarillo Symphony Youth Orchestra as it has grown from 70 to 90 members. The Youth Orchestra had their opening concert November 7, and will play a concert in Albuquerque in March before finishing their season in May with the Haydn "Farewell" Symphony. Also during the past year Dawn Harms played with the New Zealand String Quartet as first violinist and gave a master class at the University of Wellington, New Zealand. In addition she has completed her fifth season as a first violinist in the Sante Fe Opera Orchestra.

Last spring George Biffle was invited to clinic several high school and junior high school choral groups: Amarillo Tascosa High School, Amarillo Caprock High School, Canyon Randall High School, Lubbock High School, Lubbock Monterey High School, Clovis High School, Spearman High School, Canyon Valley View Jr. High School, Amarillo Horace Mann Junior High School, Amarillo Austin Jr. High School. In addition, the Choral Department held an All State Choral Workshop for area All State Candidates with over 100 participants and had its first All State Choir Camp with 67 students attending. Both Sessions will be repeated this year. Dr. Biffle appeared as choral consultant for the Lubbock Independent School District's Fall In-Service Workshop and made recruiting trips to Amarillo High School, Amarillo Palo Duro High School, Pampa High School, Clovis

High School, and Lefors High School. He hosted a choral directors workshop during the summer with guest Dr. Don Moses of the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana, attended the Texas Choral Directors Convention and Texas Music Educators Conventions in San Antonio, and was guest conductor for the Apollo Music Festival in Le Mars, Iowa.

Harry Haines gave clinics at Oaklahoma Bandmasters and at Texas Bandmasters Conventions on his new band method, *Rhythm Master*.

Amy Brandfonbrener was invited to perform at the International Viola Congress at Northwestern University.

Emanuel Lopez played with Craftsbury Chamber players in Vermont.

John Meisner and Emanuel Lopez both gave faculty recitals in the fall semester. The Harrington String Quartet will be performing in New York City on November 29, at Merkin Hall. The program will include a New York premiere of Martin Bresnick's Third Quartet.

Bill Evans and Joe Nelson collaborated on Sight Reading for Band, Vol. II, published by Southern Music Inc., in the Spring 1993, and Joe Nelson completed a new piece for band, Canto e Caccia, first performance by the 1993 Director's Band, WTAMU Band Camp.

Stanley Potter and WTAMU alumnus Wang Min, now in Los Angeles, are planning the first WTAMU International Piano Seminar to be held on campus March 4-10, 1994.

Neil Hess was honored to be guest artist at the meeting of the Southern Association of Teachers of Dancing in Nashville where he gave master classes for both teachers and students while choreographing four new dances. This fall Mr. Hess was the choreographer for the Amarillo Opera production of Kismet, and in addition to his regular duties as director of the Lone Star Ballet, he is designing new sets for the Lone Star's production of the Nutcracker ballet.
