MUSIC DEPARTMENT ONLINE

On September 1, the Department of Music and Dance was launched into cyberspace with a large website on the Internet. We have led the way in the university by providing a comprehensive site that has become a model for other departments.

The site is the project of Robert Hansen. "I attended some workshops offered by the Media Services Department, and learned the language needed to create web pages. I took it from there and found that each idea for the site inspired many more. After I completed the over-all design, I programmed the pages of the site. Madeleine Tainton, Media Services Librarian, has been an enormous help with advice, providing color and graphics, proof-reading, and lots of good suggestions." As a result, the department website offers information and complete outlines for all the degrees offered by the department. Each faculty member has an individual home page, to which they can add as much as they like. Information about performing groups, student organizations and activities, and facilities are also included. Throughout the website, browsers have the opportunity to e-mail directly from the Internet to any faculty member and to the music office. Donna Flatt has already had e-mail correspondence.

A calendar of events lists all concerts and recitals scheduled. The calendar is updated monthly and events are posted two to three months in advance.

In addition to information regarding departmental activities, we have provided links to some of the groups in which WT faculty members are active. Links currently include the Amarillo Symphony, the Lone Star Ballet, Amarillo Opera, and the National Opera Association.

Portions of the website are still under construction. "I understand completely the term 'web,' said Hansen, "since each section of the site links to other pages and on to still more. It is complicated to make sure there are no dead-ends for the browser.

"For that reason, I chose to set up the site as if it were a self-guided tour that constantly invites the browser to go through the next door, as if moving from gallery to gallery in a museum. At the moment, the website consists of just over 100 separate documents."

The last touch will be the exit page that will allow browsers to sign the guest book, request information, submit completed scholarship applications, obtain information regarding programs and camps, and so on. That feature will be available just as soon as the university installs the necessary hardware at the computer center.

ALUMNI, FRIENDS, AND PATRON NOTES

We received a letter from Jim Dees ('58-59 undergraduate) that we thought might be of interest to our readers:

"I just received my copy of Ritornello and was moved by the article oN Juenelva. I was fortunate to sit next to her in the Amarillo Symphony while still a Borger high student and then to be next to her in band her senior year. She has always been a very special person.

"I thought the readers may want to know about the reunion we had last year for A. Clyde Roller and the Amarillo Symphony. We found over 100 people who had been in the orchestra from 1948 to 1961 and more than 70 returned to pay tribute to this man who inspired so many of us Texans to go into professional music. The reunion was held in February of 1995 and we had returnees from as far away as England and Canada. We found that ex-members of the symphony and West Texas graduates were in the orchestras of New York, Chicago, Jacksonville, San Francisco and the Opera Orchestra of Chicago as well as the New York City Ballet. Many had doctorates and were teaching at the college level or were administrators of large high schools. For many of us it was the first time we had seen each other in over 30 years.

"Because of the combined inspiration of Mr. Roller, David Kaplan, Matilda Gaume, Mary Ruth McCulley, Elsa Porter, and all those faculty in the midfifties, there are many of us WT grads out there trying to give back what we have learned.

"After I had played professional clarinet for many years, I got a graduate degree in arts administration and had the privilege of helping the Berkeley Symphony bring Kent Nagano to that orchestra. For the past 20 years I have had my own talent agency here in San Francisco. But I am such a West Texan that I pursued and now have the honor to represent the Harrington String Quartet."

Sue (Smith) Hassler ('68 BM) has a piano studio in Kent, Ohio. "I have 30 students and am trying desperately to keep up with the latest technology. I have a grand piano (acoustic) and also a digital keyboard (Roland) hooked up to a computer and to a sequencer. I'm also director of music and organist at Faith Lutheran Church, where I've been for the past 18 years. My husband, Donald M. Hassler, and I have four kids, all grown, and one perfect granddaughter. I'm the piano guild chairman for Kent and belong to various and sundry music organizations. I did get a master's degree in piano pedagogy from Kent State University in 1982."

Bryan Burton ('71 BME) writes, "I was granted tenure this year [at West Chester University in West Chester, PA] and have been promoted to the rank of professor of music education. Three more

publications have included chapters by me (Multicultural Perspectives in Music Education, Second Edition, Many Seeds, Different Flowers: The Music Education Legacy of Carl Orff [an Australian textbook], and Multicultural Songs, Dances and Singing Games (published by the Organization of Kodaly Educators]) and I have lessons included in nine books of the Strategies for Teaching series being published by MENC including quite a percentage of the materials for instrumental ensembles. Oddly enough, I provided source melodies and program note information for recent band works by Anne McGinty and Quincy Hilliard. I am now serving on the editorial advisory board for MENC and doing committee work for the Society for Music Teacher Education. The usual round of conference presentations wandered through the U.S. and swam the Atlantic for a week of lectures at the Liverpool Institute for the Performing Arts and Charlotte Mason College (University of Lancashire) and another week in Amsterdam presenting three sessions for the ISME world conference. Isn't it amazing how differently our careers progress from what we envisioned as undergraduates?"

Randy Storie ('71 BME, '78 MA) is currently in his 26th year of teaching. He has been the director of bands at Robert E. Lee HS in Midland

for 17 years. This past year, the Lee Honor Band performed at the 49th annual Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago. In addition to directing the award-winning "Rebel Band," Randy is busy with his duties as chairman of the band division of TMEA.

Chrystal La Pin Franklin ('76 BME) is teaching eighth-grade English in Plainview, TX, but still plays clarinet in the Plainview Symphony. She also teaches some private clarinet. Her son, Mark, is in the sixth grade and just began cornet at school this past year. Her older children, Daniel and Beth, are off at college.

Frank Davis ('77 BME) is the new superintendent in the Channing ISD. He has taught in Channing for 19 years. He and his wife, Melody, have two children.

IN MEMORIAM

Grace Parkinson Wood Crandall died March 28, 1996, at age 101. She graduated from Amarillo HS in 1913 and received her bachelor's and master's degrees from West Texas Teacher's College. She lived most of her life in West Texas except for a few years spent in Colorado. She taught music in the public schools in West Texas and was a member of various music clubs. She is survived by a son, John W. Wood of Amarillo; two daughters, Janice Patton of Amarillo and Genelle Towner of Denver; a brother, R.B. Parkinson of Amarillo; 11 grandchildren; 21 great-grandchildren; and 12 great-grandchildren.

Weldon Bright, class of 1942, passed away in Sedona, AZ, on March 19, 1996. Weldon and his wife Nell Stevenson Bright, class of 1941, had lived in Sedona since 1984. They have both been active in the internationally known Jazz on the Rocks Festival and Weldon was still playing "gigs" for jazz parties and special events. He and his trio presented a jazz concert at the Sedona Art Center in 1995. Weldon lived in Amarillo for many years appearing on radio and TV and with his trio in the tristate area. 

THE DEPARTMENT HEAD'S CORNER


Good news! The department is experiencing a wonderful infusion of new talent. The class of 2000 (i.e. new music majors in the fall of '96) is the largest in recent years. The marching band increased in overall numbers by 35, the largest increase in one year that any of us can remember. We've had to hire a new voice teacher. Student lockers are at a premium.

The downside of all this good news is that our scholarship funds have been hard pressed. It makes our annual drive for "Patrons" more important than ever. A brief review of last year's "Patron's Page" shows the following: 6 patrons contributed \$500 or more for \$3,805; 39 scholarship donors gave \$200 or more for \$7,875; 44 sponsors sent \$100 or more for \$4,840; 201 contributors donated \$25 or more for \$6,130; and 8 persons gave \$5 or more for \$125. This made the grand total of \$22,775

In addition to your donations, we also received SHOWCASE income from program advertising and ticket sales for a total of \$36,731. After expenses for the concert, this left \$20,074 to support our three designated goals. For 1995/96 the net proceeds were spent as follows:

Ritornello \$1,508
TMEA Reception \$1,630
Scholarships \$16,937

While all three of these goals are important, the \$17,000 for scholarships was crucial. We would not have our big class of new music majors without this support. It is not too much to say that the future of the department has been shaped by your generosity.

STEP TEACHERS ASSIGNED

The first two STEP (Student Teacher Expanded Program) teachers in music have been assigned. They are John Gaertner at Amarillo High School and Brian Collins at Midland's Lee High School.

John is a clarinet major from Denton High School. Brian, a trombone graduate of Lee High School, is returning to his alma mater to intern. Both expect to graduate in May 1977, at the end of their internship.

STEP is a year-long program which substitutes for student teaching. It is an outgrowth of the "Pilot Program" in student teaching which was pioneered at WTAMU in the years 1990/95. Under a special ruling by the State Board of Education, WTAMU is the only university in Texas to offer this expanded, fieldbased approach for preparing teachers. A STEP intern receives 75% pay, is granted "teacher of record" status, and works under the direction of a committee of three (mentor teacher, building principal, university supervisor).

Independent school districts interested in employing a STEP teacher in music for 1997/98 should contact Dr. Harry Haines at the WT Music Office.

CHORAL ACTIVITIES

Greetings from the department of choral music! The goings on around the choral area are somewhat the same annually in that we produce several concerts that have developed into their unique existence. Fall, Christmas, Tour and Spring concerts, as well as the Hanging of the Lights consumes most of our efforts during the year, in addition to both the Collegiate Chorus and the WT Chorale appearing with the Amarillo Symphony Orchestra. Dates for these concerts are: Fall Concert-October 24; Amarillo Symphony-Nov. 13; Carol of the Lights-Dec. 2, Christmas Concert-Dec. 3; Chorale Tour Concert- Mar. 25; Spring Concert-April 18. 
