

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DEPARTMENT CHAIR'S COLUMN

We've received revised drawings of the new west wing addition. (Find Northen Recital Hall on the drawing to orient yourself.) Originally, it was a two-story structure to be built where the hardly-used Greek theatre is now located, but the latest plans call for a single story. On your left (to the south) will be two practice rooms large enough for small ensembles (up to 20 people) and we'll leave them unlocked for student use. In the center will be three offices, the music library for band and orchestra, band uniform storage, and school-owned instrument storage. The instrumental rehearsal area takes up most of the space and will be several feet wider and deeper than F-203 (that is, the band room or orchestral rehearsal hall or the place where jazz bands rehearsed or the percussion class, etc., depending on what your previous experiences were with that room). On the right (to the north) will be the percussion area

with a faculty office, percussion practice rooms that will be designated for marimba, or timpani, or trap set, etc., and a teaching studio and an ensemble room with storage.

Here are some random thoughts:

- The new building to the east of Northen continues. The last I heard was that they are ahead of schedule and are under budget, so that's good news. We don't expect that we will be in the building until the fall of 2005, but things seem to be moving along.
- The symphonic band was superb at TMEA if you weren't able to hear it in person.
- The Showcase of Music was a huge success. We think that we made just over \$21,000. Thank you for your support.
- The Harrington String Quartet had a campaign this year to start an undergraduate string quartet

in the fall. Through the generosity of many donors, that dream will become a reality in the fall. The students selected to be in the quartet will receive about \$4,000 per year for four years (assuming that each will be recommended for continuance at their annual evaluation in May) to rehearse and perform as a quartet.

- We had a scare when TEA announced that anyone with a bachelor's degree could become certified to teach (or that was how it was presented in our local media). It turns out that that is only for 8-12 certification. Music is all-level, so it doesn't affect us (at least not now).
- We've received information that the TExES, the new certification test that replaces ExCET, will go into effect in September for music. Originally it was delayed until 2005, but that was changed last fall. The domains are similar, but we don't know how it

- compares to the ExCET yet.
- We would really like to hear from you (as would our readers). Our alumni section is dwindling to nothing, so we need all you lurkers out there to send us something about what you're doing. I would think that you would like to hear what your classmates are doing now, so why don't you start it off, and when they see that you're doing your part, they'll do theirs. He worked as a high school band director for three years before relocating to Houston in 1987, where he was drumline instructor at Rice University for five years. Recording credits include commercials for GTE, Casa Ole, Shell and numerous local demos and a variety of album projects including CD's featuring Ed Callé and David Liebman. He currently works at San Jacinto College teaching percussion, MIDI and recording technology." See how easy that was? Please help us.

HSQ NEWS

The Harrington String Quartet performed its debut at Carnegie Hall's Weill Hall in New York City on February 14, 2004. Weill Hall, Carnegie's chamber music stage, was sold out for the performance, which was a great success. David Katz of the New York Stringer wrote, "The Harrington String Quartet gave us an adventurous program and real musicianship." The program included Anton Werbern's Langsamer Satz for String Quartet, Beethoven's String Quartet in E-flat, op. 74 (Harp), the New York premiere of Daniel McCarthy's Visions in Funk, and Ernest Chausson's Concert for Violin, Piano, and String Quartet. Joining the quartet for the Chausson work were violinist William Preucil, concertmaster of the Cleveland Orchestra, and Canadian pianist Arthur Rowe.

Upon returning to Amarillo, the quartet performed on their subscription concert series with former violist of the Cleveland Quartet, James Dunham. This spring, the quartet also had concerts at Southwestern University in Georgetown, TX, Eastern New Mexico University in Portales, NM, and on the Newberry Opera House classical chamber music series in Newberry, South Carolina.

The Quartet is also excited to announce the success of their string quartet scholarship fund-raising effort. Starting in the fall of 2004, four students will receive a string quartet scholarship award. This student quartet will work closely with the Harrington String Quartet and be performing in the community.

FACULTY FOOTNOTES

Denise Parr-Scanlin, instructor of piano, presented recitals at North Georgia College & State University in Dahlonega, Georgia, and Southern Wesleyan University in Central, South Carolina in October. At North Georgia College she performed a noon Campus and Community recital and an evening program as part of the J. L. Nix Fine Arts series. Her presentation at Southern Wesleyan University included a master class for piano majors. The all-French recitals included works by Messiaen, Debussy, Chabrier, and Poulenc. In June Ms. Parr-Scanlin will be a presenter at the state convention of the Texas Music Teachers Association in San Antonio. She will present a lecture recital on Les Soirées de Nazelles by Francis Poulenc.

ORCHESTRA NEWS

The West Texas A&M Symphony Orchestra has had a busy season. During fall semester, the orchestra performed in the annual Holiday Kick-Off Concert, in addition to its two regular semester concerts. Spring semester has seen a regular season performance (The Student Soloists Concert), and a collaboration with Dr. Cloyce Beard-Stradley and the WT Opera Workshop for three performances of Gilbert and Sullivan's The Mikado in the Branding Iron Theatre. Dr. Douglas Morrison, Director of Orchestral Activities, was also on the road in March as he traveled to Midland High School at the invitation of its orchestra conductor. Therese Simmons, to work with her fine orchestra to help prepare them for UIL contest. The WTAMU Symphony Orchestra concluded its season on April 18, with a program featuring works of Donizetti, Wagner, and Smetana.

MUSICAL THEATRE

The Branding Iron Theatre rocked at the end of February with the sounds of School House Rock. Those adorable little cartoon characters that taught you your multiplication tables, social studies lessons, science, and grammar all came to life in the spring musical production of School House Rock, Live! The annual collaboration of the theatre and music departments featured seven on-stage performers and a pit combo of four, under the direction of director of theatre Wm. CHORAL ACTIVITIES

The WT Choirs have had a productive spring. On April 24th, they combined with the Amarillo Civic Chorus and The Amarillo Symphony to perform Leonard Bernstein's Chichester Psalms with maestro James Setapen and boy soprano Nicholas Levy. The performance received a rare mid-concert standing ovation and excellent reviews. Just four days later, the WT choirs presented the work again as part of their spring concert in Northen Recital Hall. WT student soloists for this performance were Kristen Cantrell, soprano; Meredith Kemp, mezzosoprano; Matt Oglesby, tenor; and Armando Pinales, bass. The remainder of the concert featured "lighter-fare" such as various spirituals and madrigals. Dr. Robert Krause (and his oboe) joined the Collegiate Choir on James Mulholland's beautiful setting of "The Banks O' Doon." Another one of the evening's highlights was the premiere of Dr. Daniel J. Hall's arrangement of "Over the Sea to Skye" with Noel-Paul Laur at the piano, and WT senior, John Tegmeyer on clarinet. The arrangement will be published by Walton Music.

In March, the Chorale toured Dallas, Fort Worth, and Witchita Falls, with performances at Waxahachie First Baptist Church, North Crowley High School, Birdville High School, and Wichita Falls High School. The concerts went well, and the voice department is already seeing some positive results from the tour in this year's recruiting class.

In February, the WT choirs presented their annual winter concert in Northen Recital Hall. The evening included works by Brahms, Handel, René Clausen, Gwynneth Walker, and Mack Wilberg. This performance also marked the beginning of a new Winter Concert tradition by incorporating student vocal and instrumental solos from the various choral ensembles.

This coming fall, as part of their opening concert, the WT choirs will present the Texas premiere of Eric Whitacre's *Five Hebrew Love Songs*. This is a wonderfully lyrical work for mixed choir and string quartet. Dr. Hall is thrilled to announce that the choirs will be collaborating with the Harrington String Quartet for this performance. The concert is on Tuesday, October 12, at 8:00 pm in Northen Recital Hall.

OPERA WORKSHOP

Opera workshop, directed by Dr. Cloyce Beard-Stradley, had a successful run of three performances of Gilbert and Sullivan's *The Mikado* in the Branding Iron Theatre. The costumes and scenery were beautiful as well as the lovely lighting design. The onstage performers did an outstanding job. The orchestra and our resident Maestro, Douglas Morrison, were superb. It was a wonderfully entertaining show and our performers are eager for what awaits next spring!

PIANO SCHOLARSHIP AND PRIZE



Another highlight for the bands at WTAMU this spring was performing at the 24th Annual Showcase of Music Concert at the Amarillo Civic Center. This year, the program was dedicated to our friend and mentor, Dr. Dudley Moore. JAKE FEIGUM, piano


