New Building to Open in Spring2005 Fall 2005 Spring 2006 (We Hope!)

hird time is the charm, or so the saying goes, The latest rumor we are now spreading states that we will be in the new facility for the spring semester. Originally, plans were that the construction would be finished in the spring of 2005. We were thinking April. Sometime in the fall semester that date was pushed back to July 15, 2005. In January of this year, 47 bad weather days were added to July 15. We have had some strange weather. In order for the workers to pour concrete, they had to have three days of dry weather. We would get two days and then we would get rain. Or we would have one dry day, one wet, two dry, one wet, two and a half dry, and then some rain. Today (May 2) it snowed, so very little was done because of safety issues. All the troughs that have been constructed for foundations will have to be pumped. It's a real mess here. Meanwhile, we're waiting patiently.

But we're not the only ones having trouble. The Amarillo Globe-News Performing Arts Center, immediately to the west of the Civic Center, was supposed to open on October 15. The date now has been pushed back to January 21, 2006.

We're not sure when or how the big move will happen, but we'll gladly deal with it when it does. As construction nears completion, I'm sure we'll be given more details. For right now, we can watch the corn grow (although the Fine Arts Complex on the east side of Northen is really beginning to take shape; and the west side today is dirt with a two- or three-inch layer of mud icing, mostly contained within some concrete outlines, but some of the icing has run over the edge so that we can track it into the buildings or wherever we travel).

We've been told that faculty in the classroom center will be moving into the Fine Arts Building after our move while the entire CC undergoes remodeling, which will be an 18month project. (That is, if the weather is nice!) I'm glad that someone else will be able to enjoy the green-tiles that adorn the hallway walls and the lovely lime-colored linoleum.


The university is planning the open house for Fine Arts Complex and the Northen west wing instrumental rehearsal area and percussion studios. The grand opening is scheduled

The choral students were excited to host the Region I UIL choir contest again this year. It provided a wonderful opportunity to get to know area directors and their students. It was also a particularly valuable experience for WT students planning to teach public school.

The recruiting process continues to go well. Several students who were recruited to the various choirs as non-majors last year have since discovered that music is their primary interest and have auditioned for the voice faculty and changed their majors to music. As recruitment of incoming freshmen continues along with this sort of internal recruiting, the program will continue to increase in strength.

The final choral concert of the year was April 26, at 8 p.m. in Northen Recital Hall and featured a variety of choral styles.

ORCHESTRA

The West Texas A&M University Symphony Orchestra has had one of its busiest seasons in recent years. The orchestra opened the 2004-2005 season in September with a program featuring WT faculty member Joanna Mendoza as soloist in the Romance in F for Viola and Orchestra by Max Bruch. Also on the program were the Symphony No. 41 ("Jupiter") of Mozart, and the Second Suite from Bizet's L'Arlesienne.

The second concert of the season, in November, featured another of WT's wonderful music faculty, Dr. Tina Carpenter, in Gordon Jacob's Concerto for Bassoon and Strings. Schubert's Symphony No. 8 ("Unfinished"), and Tchaikovsky's brilliant orchestral showpiece *Capriccio italien* rounded out the afternoon performance.

Utilizing music from both programs, the WT Symphony Orchestra set out on 11 November for a two-day "mini-tour" in Midland-Odessa and performed for orchestra classes at both Midland and Lee High Schools and a full evening concert at Abell Junior High School. All performances were enthusiastically received, and special thanks go to Therese Simmons and Karen McAfee (a WT alum), who have built such wonderful orchestral programs there.

The old expression states "There's no rest for the wicked, and the good don't need any." This was demonstrated by the fact that the orchestra's next performance, the annual Holiday Kick-Off Concert, was presented just one week after returning from Midland. This popular program is a collaborative effort with the WT choral ensembles and their director Dr. Daniel Hall.

The spring semester has been equally demanding on our orchestral musicians at West Texas: the student soloists concert in February featured Tiffany Jackson, violin; Erin Edwards, oboe; and Michael Gibson, piano; along with Mendelssohn's Symphony No. 4 ("Italian"). Late March found the orchestra in the pit of the Branding Iron Theatre for two performances of Mozart's comic opera *The Marriage of Figaro* in conjunction with the WT Opera Theatre, Dr. Cloyce Kuhnert, director.

The 2004-2005 season ended on Sunday, April 24th, 3:00 pm, with an all-Beethoven program featuring WT faculty member Denise Parr-Scanlin in the Piano Concerto No. 1 in C major, followed by the dramatic Symphony No. 5 in C minor.

This season has also been a very busy one for WT's director of orchestral activities, Dr. Douglas Morrison. In addition to preparing and presenting all of the WT Symphony Orchestra programs, Morrison served his first year as music director/ conductor of the Amarillo Symphony Youth Orchestra I and was featured as the first conductor in the history of Chamber Music Amarillo, conducting Mozart's Symphony No. 33 in Bb major. Dr. Morrison also visited, critiqued, and rehearsed numerous middle and high schools in the Amarillo area, and will serve as an adjudicator for the upcoming Greater Southwest Music Festival.
