FROM THE DEPARTMENT HEAD

Now for some sad news. We have several faculty changes for next fall.

Sally Turk, associate professor of flute, is taking a leave of absence next year. She will be teaching class piano and choir at a boarding school in Switzerland.

Joanna Mendoza, violist with the Harrington String Quartet for the last ten years, has accepted a faculty position at the University of Oklahoma as associate professor of viola.

Composer Dr. Robert Denham, who joined the faculty last fall, has accepted a similar position at his alma mater, Biola University, in Southern California.

We wish them all well in their new pursuits.

And the good news is that although Mr. Evans retired May 31, an offer has been made to his replacement but has not yet been formally accepted.

The year-long search for a first violinist for the Harrington String Quartet is nearing an end. A candidate has been offered the position and there are some details that will need to be worked out before an official announcement can be made. We're close.

We'll conduct searches during the summer to fill the other vacancies and we'll report back in the next issue of *Ritornello* with bios of the new additions.

There will be other changes to report as well. Dr. Sue Park retired as dean on January 15. Mr. Royal Brantley, department head of art, communication, and theatre, served as interim dean during the spring semester. Since then the university has announced that Dr. James A. Rennier, music department head at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi, will assume the duties of dean on July 1.

In September, there are supposed to be organizational changes as well. The department of music and dance will become the department of music. Dance will move to art, theatre, and dance. The communication part of what has been ACT will become its own department that will combine speech, mass communications, and radio and television. Finally, the department of history and geography will move to the college. Everyone will physically stay where they are, but the college will have a new configuration.

The combined WT choirs performed for the annual Showcase of Music (Friday, April 13), as well as performances of the Mozart *Requiem* with the Amarillo Symphony and Amarillo Civic Chorus (April 20-21). Other performances included the spring choir concert (Tuesday, April 24).

MUSICAL THEATRE

The West Texas A&M University theatre program produced the musical comedy "Nunsense" by Dan Goggin February 14-17 and 21-24. It was the first musical production to be offered in the new fine arts complex Branding Iron Theatre with the season theme of "The House Is Open!" This show is an all-time box office favorite. The musical tells of the story of five nuns in a wild variety show. The nuns are trying to bury their dead sisters who died in a tragic cooking accident. The cast included Camille Medina, Sierra Petty, Laura Harrell, Stephanie Bunger, and Anna McVey. It was 100 minutes of pure fun. Royal Brantley, head of ACT, was the director. Joe Ella Cansler, associate professor of music, was the production's music director. Leslie Williams, assistant professor of dance, was the choreographer.

OPERA

The WTAMU opera workshop, directed by Dr. Cloyce Kuhnert, and with the WTAMU symphony, conducted by Dr. Mark Bartley, presented Mozart's *Così fan tutte*. The cast included: Shayla Fezette and Brandy Jenkins as Fiordiligi; Brenda Kennedy and Samantha Puckett as Dorabella; Alex Costello as Ferrando, Robert Cardwell as Guglielmo; Rachel Johnson as Despina; and Brian Kuhnert as Don Alfonso. Our staff accompanist, Jan Walser, dressed as Mozart, played the recitative accompaniment.

This was the first operatic performance given in the new Branding Iron Theatre. Not only was the stage a joy to perform upon, but the acoustics were the best ever experienced in a WT opera. The balance between the orchestra and voices was absolutely top notch. The orchestra played wonderfully and the singers sang beautifully. If you haven't experienced our fine opera productions at WT, please make plans to come see us next year.

ORCHESTRA NEWS

The WTAMU symphony's live cinema event last October filled Mary Moody Northen Recital Hall to capacity with hundreds more left waiting to see an encore presentation later that evening. The 1929 silent film The Phantom of the Opera was screened while the orchestra performed a score by Canadian composer Gabriel Thibaudeau in synchronization with the movie. Senior music business major Rachel Johnson enthralled the audience as the featured soprano soloist, singing arias from Gounod's Faust and adding the occasional scream in time with the action on-screen.

Phantom was the first venture of the WTAMU symphony under new conductor Dr. Mark Bartley. In addition to the performance in Northen Hall, the ensemble presented Phantom at the historic Ector Theater in Odessa. Late in November, the orchestra performed on the annual Christmas concert combined with the WTAMU choirs under the direction of Dr. Daniel Hall. A busy spring semester has thus far brought performances in the new Branding Iron Theatre of Mozart's Cosi fan tutte with WTAMU opera and an appearance at the Showcase of Music in the Amarillo Civic Center. On April 26, the orchestra performed a Russian Masterworks concert in Northen Hall. The program included Mussorgsky's Night on Bald Mountain and Pictures at an Exhibition, and featured two student soloists: Lyndi Fisher singing Rachmaninoff's Vocalise and Lyndsay Eiben playing the flute version of Khachaturian's Concerto for Violin and Orchestra.

BANDS

This spring has been a very exciting time for the WTAMU symphonic band. Our tour to the Midland/Odessa area was a wonderful opportunity for students and directors of that area to hear what we have to offer at WTAMU. William Takacs was our featured soloist on the tour. He dazzled each and every audience. While on the tour we were able to

present eight concerts, and we would like to thank the directors of Permian, Crane, Midland Lee, Midland High, Big Spring, Lubbock Monterey, Lubbock High and Plainview for all of their efforts.

At the Showcase of Music concert on April 13, we presented four band scholarships in Dr. Dudley Moore's name. This year's recipients were David Lough from Canyon, Caitlin McCready from Midland, Lyndsay Eiben from Odessa, and Kerry Hughes from Amarillo.

Our instrumental band clinic and concert was a success again this year. This was the seventeenth year that we have hosted the event on the WTAMU campus. The visiting bands were Canyon High School, Tascosa High School, Lubbock Coronado High School, and Midland Lee High School. Dr. Gary Garner and I were the band clinicians for the day. In addition, our wind and percussion faculty taught master classes to each of the high schools.

Our final concerts were on Wednesday, April 25.
