Enrollment in music majors took a big jump in 1984/85 with one of the largest freshman classes in recent years. The music faculty has worked very hard at student recruitment but the key factor has been alumni support. We greatly appreciate your continued endorsement of our program and the assistance you are giving in sending your best students to us as music majors.

In Memoriam

Bands

The biggest news of the year for the band came recently with the announcement that the WTSU Foundation, through the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Lair of Canyon, is donating funds for the purchase of new band uniforms next fall. Our current uniforms, now in their 14th year of use, have long needed replacement, and the news was greated with great jubilition by band members.

By the time of the publication of this issue of the *Ritornello*, the 1985 Symphonic Band concert tour will be history. We are now preparing for a trip to the Rio Grande Valley, March 6-8. We will fly to Harlingen on Southwest Airlines, then travel to area schools on charter buses. Tour stops include: Pharr-San Juan Alamo HS and Harlingen HS on Wednesday, March 6; King HS (Kingsville), Tuloso-Midway HS (Corpus Christi), and Raymondville HS on Thursday, March 7; and Edinburg HS, Memorial HS (McAllen), and Hanna HS (Brownsville) on Friday, March 8.

Orchestra

The orchestra is experiencing slow but steady growth, and the quality of string playing continues to show steady progress. The cello section trebled in size this year, from two to six, all majors! The orchestra will present two concerts this semester before opera preparation begins. The first, February 24, featured guest soloists Sally Turk, Liz Lad, and James Lyon in the Bach Brandenburg Concerto No. 4. The program concluded with Beethoven's Eroica symphony, a real milestone for the orchestra. The final concert, April 9, will consist of Wagner's Siegfried Idyll, Trittico botticelliano by Respighi, and the Zelter viola concerto, featuring senior violist Linda Chelf of Amarillo.

West Texas Choral Groups

WTSU choirs were happy to sponsor a concert on March 2 with Dr. Kenneth Jennings, Meadows Professor in Music, St. Olaf's College, Minnesota, as Artistim-Residence. The choirs gave a splendid performance of Bach's Magnificat and motet The Spirit Also Helpeth Us under his direction. The annual Chorale tour begins on March 29 with a concert in Spearman. It continues with concerts in Wichita, KS, Tulsa, OK, Texarkana, AR, Dallas, and Plano, and concludes with a triumphant "Home Concert" on Thursday, April 4, in Northen Recital Hall.

Dance Groups

The spring production of the Lone Star Ballet Company was Jesus Christ, Superstar, which featured many members of the WT dance classes. In March the WTSU Dance Ensemble received national attention and praise from noted critics for its performance at the American College Dance Festival Southwest Regional Convention. Not only did the group perform on the final Gala Perfor-

mance, but it was chosen as the last number on the entire program. This same ensemble, known as "Dancin' People," will present a series of performances later in the spring for area schools to promote growth and interest in dance. A busy year!

Harrington String Quartet

Arts Festival in Plainview, clinics in Ponca City and Enid, OK, school concerts in Amarillo, Canyon, and Roswell, NM, recitals in Amarillo, Canyon, Taos, NM, and at the Texas Music Educators Association Convention in San Antonio in February, and much more. All this adds up to a busy season for the Harrington String Quartet. Future plans include a performance at the Carson County Square House Museum and a recital at. the Dallas Public Library. A new element, was added to the foursome this spring: Dr. Alexis Valk, string bass faculty member, and Burt Rosevear of the voice faculty performed with the quartet at the Grand Faculty Recital in February.

Grand Faculty Recital

On February 22, the music department sponsored its first Grand Faculty Recital, a program consisting entirely of music faculty performances. Northen Recital Hall was filled. The concert began with two pieces performed by the WTSU Faculty Brass Quintet (Ritter, Cox, Lemon, and TAs Paul Lindley and Steve Smiley). Next followed a movement from a Zelenka trio sonata (Turk, Krause, Hammel, Lad, and Eason), Barber's Dover Beach (Rosevear and the Harrington String Quartet), a Galles sonata performed on harpsichord by George Eason, Silfer's Marimba Suite (Susan

Martin), a Bizet aria by Lloyd Hanson, a Bruch Trio (Rowie Durden, clarinet; Matt Lad, cello; and Liz Lad, piano), and Turina's La oracion del torero (Valk and the Harrington String Quartet). The evening's piece de resistance was the final movement of Stravinsky's Octet performed by Turk, Durden, Hammel, Kathy Kendle, Ritter, Lindley, Cox, and Haines under Dr. Garner's direction. A very nice reception was held in the atrium following the concert. Because of the enthusiastic response, it appears that this too will become an annual event.

Music Therapy

Much activity in the music therapy department this year. The spring semester has featured a series of workshops with "The Creative Arts in Therapy" as the central theme. Mark Rider, R.M.T., has just completed "Imagery and Pain Control" and "Improvisation," and later workshops will concentrate on dance and art in therapy. Therapy students are looking forward to meeting Dr. Richard Graham, R.M.T., University of Georgia, who will be visiting the campus in March as a member of an accreditation committee charged with the responsibility of reviewing the university's overall program. Then there's the Southwest Region Convention of NAMT on April 12 and 13 in Odessa and a general therapy demonstration recital on April 24 in Northen Recital Hall. WT therapy students are also delighted to have been invited to participate in "A Day of Arts for the Handicapped" to be held at the Amarillo Art Center on April 27.

Piano and Organ Festival

More than 150 keyboard students attended the Sixth Annual Piano and Organ Competition Festival on March 2. Dr. Jack Hendrix of Odessa College and Marjorie Urban of Perryton served as adjudicators.

The local chapter of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia pledged eight new members this year and then put them to work, hosting receptions and helping with UIL Competitions, the Piano and Organ Festival, and various other campus activities. Many members are planning to attend the Province Workshop in Lubbock, March 17-18. A special invitation is extended to all alumni to come to the annual member and faculty recital on April 15 in Northen Hall.

Distinguished Alumni

Even a casual overview of guest recitalists on campus this year reveals an abundance of WT alumni, and of these most are vocalists. Early last semester baritone David Robinson (1976, MM; 1974, BME) appeared in recital with Bill Evans of the WT music faculty premiering two song cycles by Mr. Evans, "Five Songs of Love and Laughter" and "Songs of Journey". Also last semester Benjamin Wakefield (1979, MM), baritone, was heard in recital assisted by Raenell McDonough (1968, BME). In October, an area resident tenor and former WT English faculty member Don Williams presented a recital with Eddie White, a former WT piano major.

The spring semester, not to be outdone, began with the first official Distinguished Alumni Artist, soprano Lauran Fulton. Lauran, who is quite actively pursuing a singing career, sang to a near capacity crowd in Northen Hall. Lauran's appearance was made possible through the joint efforts of the Foundation for Fine Arts and the university Specal Departmental Programs Committee, both of WTSU. Later in the semester, and with the assistance of the Foundation for Fine Arts, Lynda Sharman (1971, MA; 1970, BA), soprano, was heard in recital with Lorna Schultz (1972, MA). Both Lauran and Lynda gave master classes for WT vocal students.

Another alumni recital featured percussionist Ray Dillard (1983, MM; 1981, BM), soprano Cindy Cole (1984, MM; 1982, BM), and former WT music faculty Steve Paxton. Their group called "The Paxton Group", appeared in concert in New York City and England in March.

Another program brought to campus through the assistance of the Special Departmental Programs Committee featured soprano Debra Crawley, baritone Douglas Crawley, and pianist Mark Snow.

Occassionally, out of the blue, comes a musical experience so unanticipated that its impact becomes forever memorable by all those who participated. Such was the recital appearance of pianist Idil Biret. The response of the audience during and after the program was testament to the remarkable musicianship and pianism of this French-trained pianist. Mme Biret went from the WT campus to Ft. The annual Choir Camp for high school students will be held from August 4 through August 9. As always emphasis will be placed on learning the All-State Choir music before school starts.
