WTSU is the only satellite program in the Unite

WTSU is the only satellite program in the United States offered under the auspices of the Kodaly Center of America. All faculty are chosen by KCA and the curriculum is designed to follow that of the Kodaly Pedagogical Institute of Kecskemet, Hungary. KCA Certification is regarded as the most prestigious in America and exceeds the standards recommended by OAKE (Organization of American Kodaly Educators).

The curriculum is divided into three levels and is offered during the first summer term each year on the campus in Canyon. The credits are as follows:

Level II, 6 semester hours credit Level III, 6 semester hours credit Level III, 6 semester hours credit

The 16 hours listed may be counted toward a masters degree. The M.A. degree has two options: (1) 30 hours with thesis, (2) 36 hours for non-thesis option.

Instructors for the 1988 Kodaly Institute were Lynn Herson Grad, Haverstown, Pennsylvania, Susan Holm, Norway, Jean Rebello, Doylestown, Pennsylvania, Bruce Swank, Englewood, Ohio. Instructors in previous years have included Klara Nemes, Kecskemet, Hungary (from the faculty of the Kodaly Institute), and Eileen Findley, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The WTSU program began in 1985 with one teacher (Lynn Grad) offering the first half of Level One. Now it its fourth year, there were 40 students enrolled this summer in various classes at three levels.

Dr. Ted DuBois will be the coordinator for the 1989 Kodaly Program at WTSU and is the university's advisor for graduate study in music. Persons interested in Kodaly Certification and/or graduate study are invited to contact him.

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



Elsa Porter Named Music Teacher of the Year

Elsa Porter, coordinator of vocal studies at WTSU, was named Music Teacher of the Year at the Amarillo Music Teachers Association's spring banquet held at Polk Street United Methodist Church on May 10.

Miss Porter joined the music faculty in 1956 and in the ensuing years her students have won symphony competitions, international vocal competitions, district Metropolitan Opera auditions, and have made professional New York debuts. Two students were finalists in the Mu Phi Epsilon International Sterling Staff auditions and one was awarded a nationwide three-year concert tour as winner. More recently, in the fall of 1987, three of her WT undergraduates were first place winners in the Great Plains district audition of the National Association of Teachers of Singing.

Elsa Porter has been soloist with the Amarillo Symphony on several occasions and has sung in and directed WT opera/musical theatre productions, including Showboat, Carousel, Fantasticks, and My Fair Lady.

The Harrington String Quartet

The Harrington String Quartet was one of four United States string quartets to compete in an international competition in Portsmouth, England.
