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
Band Clinic Features John Paynter

The Fifth Annual
WTAMU Band Clinic was held
on Saturday, April 1, 1995.
Dr. John Paynter, Director of
Bands at Chicago's
Northwestern University was
this year's guest
clinician/conductor.

Dr. Paynter is one of the most renowned band conductors in America. He is president of the Mid-West National Band and Orchestra Clinic, pastpresident of the American Bandmasters

Association, and cofounder, past president, and honorary life president of the National Band Association. He is also recognized as a leader in the community band movement having served as conductor of the Northshore Concert Band since 1956. Previous guest clinicians have been Dr. Harry Begian (1991 and 1993), Dr. Ralph Laycock (1992), and Dr. Robert Reynolds (1994).

Each year four outstanding high school bands are invited to participate in the Clinic. For 1995 the bands were Amarillo High School (Roger Edwards, Director), Coronado High School of Lubbock (Anthony Gibson, Director), Houston School for Performing & Visual Arts (Nathan Carter, Director), and Randall High School (Ken Carriere, Director). Other bands over the five-year history of the clinic have included Abilene/Cooper, Borger, Canyon, Clovis, The Colony, Dumas, Hereford,

Midland, Midland/Lee, Odessa, Odessa/Permian, and Pampa.

An important feature of the day's events is an opportunity for students in each band to work for an hour with WTAMU faculty who are specialists for a particular instrument. For example, the flutes in each of the above named bands received a one-hour master class from Sally Turk, WT flute teacher. Each clarinet section worked with

Douglas Storey, oboes with Robert Krause, bassoons with Tina Carpenter, saxophones with Donald Lefevre, trumpets with David Ritter, horns with Ron Lemon, trombones with Joseph Cox, and percussion with Susan Martin. Students and directors alike have praised this opportunity as "One of the most beneficial aspects of the clinic."

The level of music performance at these clinics has been remarkable. Each year the day peaks with a concert featuring the four participating bands and the WT Symphonic Band. The 1995 concert closed with an outstanding performance of Beatrice et Benedict Overture with John Paynter conducting. Those who were present will long remember it.

Greetings from the choral music department. This year is disappearing in a hurry. The Fall semester was eventful, with sucessful Fall and Christmas concerts, a sold out Madrigal Dinner, and a delightful evening with Basso Samuel Ramey and the Amarillo Symphony. This spring the Chorale is touring the eastern side of New Mexico, performing in high schools in Clovis, Portales, Roswell, and Hobbs. Tour dates are March 29-31. We hope to recruit, or at least open some doors at WTAMU to those talented New Mexican choral singers. New Mexico students with a 3.0 grade point and a \$200 scholarship offer from us also

get an out-of-state tuition waiver from the state of Texas. Their education at WT would be less expensive for them than an in-state education at home.

The Madrigal Dinner has been invited to perform at Pampa for the Fine Arts Association on April 22. We will bundle up the entire project and head that way for another evening of feasting, singing, and dancing for the general merriment of the Pampa folks (should be a lot of fun).

The last year of our Meadows grant for choral music is this year; a sad time indeed. We have really enjoyed having those funds and the added opportunities that they have produced. The tenor will be sung by Dr. Randall Black, artist -in-residence at Murray State University in Murray, Kentucky. Both of these gentlemen are wonderful singers and we look forward to spending several days with them on our campus. Both of these men will also present master classes for our singers. The other work on the program will be the Ralph Vaughan Williams' Serenade to Music, featuring sixteen soloists, chorus, and orchestra. Outstanding singers from our area will be asked to sing, in addition to Nelson, Black, and our WT voice faculty. Come and join us, it should be a glorious occasion.

Alumni, if you know of talented singers in your area, encourage them to consider WTAMU's vocal music department. Your enthusiasm and backing could make a real difference to our music program. We appreciate your support, and see you at the concert!

DANCE

The Department of Dance has had a busy and productive Spring semester. Immediately after the Christmas break, a choreographer named Jonathan Riesling from the Alvin Ailey Dance company from New York was on campus teaching master classes and choreographing a concert piece called "tribe" for the WTAMU appearance at the American College Dance Festival in San Marcos, Texas in March.

Lisa Hess-Jones came one day after Mr. Riesling departed, to set a classical piece to Respighi music for the same festival. Earlier in the year, Alexia Hess came to choreograph a Broadway style work to music by Tommy Dorsey, which will give an added variety to the performances at the College Festival.

The dancers at WTAMU received some good news from the Governor's office in Austin. The ensemble group has been invited to perform under the auspices of the governor for a special Gala, celebrating the rededication of the Texas State Capital Building. This event will take place April 21-22.

Early in February, the dancers from WTAMU performed at a festival in Dallas along with twenty-two dance companies from the Southwest.

Another major of the dance department has been working with student Leslie Hethcox on his first choreographic endcavor. Leslie's creation is to music by Sibelius and is in two movements. Mr. Hess, director of the Dance Department, has selected this piece for performance in San Marcos as a student work. Another highlight for the WTAMU dancers was an appearance at Valley School near Turkey, Texas. This concert brought a large audience from small towns in the area and served as a goodwill tour for WTAMU.

Dancers from West Texas A&M University and from the Lone Star Ballet recently performed in the "Dances at a Gathering" Festival in Dallas under the auspices of the Chamberlain Ballet of Plano. The festival took place on Saturday, February 11th with participants from dance companies throughout Texas and Arkansas.

The annual musical, Barnum, has transformed the Branding Iron Theatre into a Big Top teeming with clowns, acrobats, aerialists, and jugglers. No efforts were spared to bring Joice Heth, the oldest woman alive, Tom Thumb, the world's shortest man, and Jumbo, the largest elephant in captivity, to the stage. The musical is a biographical panorama of America's greatest showman, Phineas Taylor Barnum. DON BAIRD MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Recently, Jim Hutson, band chairman for Region I, presented a check in the amount of \$3,300 for the Don Baird Memorial Scholarship fund to Harry Haines, WT music department head. Region I donates the gate receipts from their all-region band concerts to this fund which provides scholarships for Region I band students to attend WTAMU.

By vote of the directors, 50% will go for scholarships for students for the fall of 1995. The remaining 50% will go into an endowment to provide a permanent source of support for these scholarships

which honor the memory of Don Baird. This year's gift of \$1,650 brings the total endowment to \$4,842.14. The endowment has earned \$738.36 which combined with this year's gift will make available a total of \$2,378.36 for Don Baird scholarships for the coming year.

Mr. Baird was the low brass instructor at WT and the UIL Executive Secretary for Region I at the time of his death in 1979. He taught at the university for 16 years beginning in 1963. Those of us who knew Don Baird are especially pleased to see this tribute to his memory grow and help band students from Region I.
