Juanelva Rose Named Outstanding Person in Taiwan

Dr. Juanelva Rose, professor of music at Tunghai University in Taichung, Taiwan, visited on our campus and in Canyon during the week of February 4. Dr. Rose, who graduated from WT in 1958, is touring this area with one of her former students and one of her current colleagues at Tunghai, giving concerts and doing a lot of visiting. Yi-Lin Hsu, soprano, and Teh-Ling Chuang, pianist, accompanied by Dr. Rose on the piano and the clarinet, presented concerts in Northen Hall as well as in Canyon, Dumas, Tulia, Plainview and Lubbock. Dr. Yi-Lin Hsu currently serves as chairman of the music department at Tunghai, while Teh-Ling Chuang is studying for her doctor's degree at the University of Cincinnati (Ohio) College Conservatory of Music. The three of them were honored with a luncheon in the Buffalo Room on Tuesday, February 6, hosted by WT Music Faculty.

At Tunghai University, Juanelva teaches music theory, music history, and piano. She also teaches at Naching College of Arts and the Szchuan Conservatory in Chengtu on the Chinese mainland. She performs regularly not only all over the island of Taiwan, but also in Indonesia and in mainland China. No wonder Juanelva was named Outstanding Person

of the Year in 1995 by the "Outstanding Person Organization" in Taiwan. The only foreigner to be so named, she was an honored guest at a tea held by the president of the Republic of China, Lee Tens-hui. Jaunelva was further—and highly—honored when the new concert hall on the Tunghai University campus was named for her.

And no wonder that the WTAMU Music Department is more than proud to claim her as one of our most outstanding graduates!

In keeping with the object of the workshop, the focus is on learning repertoire and developing acting skills, so sets, costumes, and props are kept to a minimum.

MUSIC THERAPY

Congratulations to Ludim Pedroza and Jill Darr who placed second and third in the Second Annual Student Research Conference at West Texas A&M University, November 3, 1995, in the category of music and art. Both presentations were a result of projects that were done in the class "Influence of Music on Behavior." Ludim's presentation was a comparison between the imagination and creativity of music majors and business majors at WTAMU and was entitled "Possible Manifestations of Imaginative Qualities Presented by Music and Business Majors." Jill's project was to evaluate and make recommendations on productivity using music on an assembly line. Her paper was entitled "The Effects of Music on Assembly Line Production." Three other students from the music therapy department presented papers in this conference.

Martha Estes and seven of her students attended the National Association of Music Therapy conference in Houston in November. Several WTAMU alumnae gave presentations. The national conference is an opportunity to see the impact and diversity of the growing field of music therapy. Stacey Hensel, a music therapy student at WTAMU, was selected to serve on the clinical training committee.

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice and Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center have established a new model of treatment at the John T. Montford Psychiatric Medical Unit in Lubbock. This facility is providing psychiatric care for the 550 mentally ill inmates at the unit. Martha Estes, assistant professor of music therapy at WTAMU, has been hired as a consultant in the music therapy department. This department has three RMT positions, one master's level and two bachelor level, one of which has been filled by WT alumni Karen Dorn. This unit has also hired WTAMU music therapy student Jill Darr for this semester. Jill will return to


WT in the fall and will share her experiences with the students in the music therapy program.
